

UPDATES

Three-Year Road Paving Program

A road improvement program is set to begin May 2025, bringing safer streets to our community. Phase 1 Highlights: resurfacing 7.5 miles of roadway, enhanced safety and smoother driving, long-term infrastructure improvements – all paid with state funds. Additionally, reflective street signs and stop signs are being installed.



We understand that construction may cause temporary disruptions, but we appreciate your patience and cooperation as we work toward a better driving experience for all.

Smarter, Safer Streets: Traffic Signal Upgrades

PennDOT Multimodal Transportation Fund **grants** awarded in **2019 & 2021**, totaling **\$377,805**, is allowing the Borough to upgrade the traffic signal at N Pennsylvania Ave (SR 2073) & Trenton Ave (SR 2026). Recent and ongoing improvements include:



- Traffic signal maintenance completed in June 2024
- Seeking additional funding through PennDOT
- Planning to further modernize our traffic signal infrastructure
- Grants to replace all traffic signals with a colonial powered black look

These upgrades will help reduce congestion, improve pedestrian safety, and optimize traffic flow across Morrisville.

South Pennsylvania Avenue Traffic Study

The Borough is conducting a study focused on reducing speeding, improving pedestrian safety, and enhancing the overall streetscape. Recommendations and findings will be presented at a future Council Meeting.

Potential improvements (through grants) include:

- ✓ Gateway treatments to create a welcoming entrance
- ✓ Raised medians for better traffic flow
- ✓ Pedestrian crossing bump-outs for street crossings
- ✓ New striping patterns to improve navigation
- ✓ Designated on-street parking for added convenience



A Big Win for Morrisville: A Community-Led Victory

For years, heavy commercial truck traffic along S Penn Ave disrupted daily life for residents. Thanks to the Truck Ban, residents are noticing, and State and local officials are celebrating a major milestone. Since the prohibition of trucks over 10 tons, Borough Police have issued 300 citations for violating the ban and educated truck drivers about alternate routes.

Senator Steve Santarsiero: *"The issue of excessive truck traffic impacted residents for too long. Working with the Borough and PennDOT, we've implemented a solution that improves safety and protects our roads from heavy truck damage."*

Representative Jim Prokopiak: *"This is a major milestone in our efforts to reduce truck traffic. The installation of signage, enforcement efforts, and community advocacy have resulted in safer, quieter neighborhoods in Morrisville."*

Borough Council President Helen Hlahol: *"Thanks to those who listened to our concerns and took action to improve the quality of life in Morrisville Borough—especially the First Ward. Their partnership and commitment are invaluable in turning concerns into positive change."*

Mayor Gary Wallace: *"If you have concerns, bring them to the Borough. This is an example of residents voicing concerns, and the Borough and elected officials taking action to help."*



Morrisville Borough Police Chief Ciampa emphasized that enforcement is a top priority, saying: *"We began enforcement in January. We've stopped more than 300 trucks. We will continue to ensure compliance."*

Joe M., a resident of S. Pennsylvania Avenue: *"I have seen a huge reduction in trucks on my street. I understand more has to be done, but it is great to see us moving in a positive direction."*

What's Changed?

- New Penn DOT signs along S. Penna Ave. directs trucks to use Philadelphia Ave & Tyburn Road.
- Speed limits reduced:
 - 55 mph → 45 mph (Tyburn Rd. to 3rd St.)
 - 45 mph → 25 mph (West Philadelphia Ave)
 - 30 mph → 25 mph (Philadelphia Ave. to Post Rd.)
- Reclassification of S. Pennsylvania Ave. to further limit trucks.
- Google Maps updates to dissuade trucks from using residential streets.
- Ordinance passed March 2025, prohibits municipal waste trucks from using Borough Streets as a cut through.

Did You Know:

PA State Law: **You must park in the direction of traffic**, you should always park facing the same direction as the traffic flow, and parking against the flow of traffic is a violation.

Borough Ordinance: Dog owners to clean up and dispose of all solid dog waste promptly after it occurs on any public place or private property not their own.

Borough Ordinance: **Parking regulations restrict the size and type of vehicles allowed on roadways**, streets, alleys, and Borough parking areas, including trailers, or tractor trailer combination, truck or bus, and no trailer of any size, including boat trailers, U-Haul trailers or other apparatus for hauling drawn by an automobile, truck or tractor or any recreational vehicle (RV), mobile home, boat and/or trailer.

Borough Ordinance: **No person shall drive or park any vehicle upon a sidewalk or sidewalk area** except upon a pavement or duly authorized temporary driveway. A sidewalk area includes the portion from the curb to and including the sidewalk and including the green belt between the curb and sidewalk.

Manor Park Playground is Getting a Makeover!

Opening in time for summer, Morrisville Borough is thrilled to announce that we've been **awarded a \$300,000** Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to revitalize Manor Park Playground—located at Penn Avenue and E. Cleveland Avenue! We're also incredibly grateful for **corporate support, including a \$50,000 donation and a generous donation of playground mulch** that helped bring this project to fruition.

Inclusive & Accessible Additions: Swings designed for various ages and abilities, a bobble spring rider, accessible pathways, sensory-rich equipment to provide interactive and engaging experiences – we hope to keep the merry-go-round.

Thank you to our generous community for their continued support! This project is a reflection of Morrisville's commitment to creating safe, fun, and inclusive spaces for all families.

Economic Development in Town

Stockham Building – Since August 2024, Morrisville Borough has been **actively working to** jumpstart renovations for the Stockham Building. The Borough, State Senator Steve Santarsiero, County Officials, Representative Jim Prokopiak, the Industrial Redevelopment Authority, and the Redevelopment Authority have been **meeting with the building's owners to move this project forward**. Even though architectural renderings were received, unforeseen hurdles have recently emerged with newly discovered structural issues.



Clover Leaf Property (S. Penna Ave across from the Cemetery) – Work by the Bucks County Redevelopment Authority will begin to remediate the property to remove environmental conditions which currently exist. This is the first step in positioning the property for future redevelopment. The Borough **has not received any formal applications nor approved any plans** for any use of the property, but has issued a permit to remediate the onsite soils.

Grant Dollars award to the Borough

- **Congressman Fitzpatrick provided \$8 million dollars** to spur economic development.
- **State Sen Steve Santarsiero awarded nearly a quarter million dollars** for Borough ADA accessibility improvement projects and \$1.75 million to the Schools for roof replacement.
- **Rep Jim Prokopiak funded \$180,000** in needed public safety equipment.
- While the Borough pursued and was awarded over **\$5 million for projects and improvements** with only \$300,000 match paid by the Borough. (To date 2025, the Borough has received nearly half a million dollars).

ARPA FUNDS (American Rescue Plan Act of 2021)

Morrisville Borough received **\$894,706.28** through the **COVID-19 Stimulus Package** used for **much-needed infrastructure repairs to the Municipal Building** and **significant upgrades to security and computer systems**. This strategic use of federal funding eased the financial burden on residents:

- 1) Traffic Signal upgrades/repairs
- 2) HVAC upgrades: Ambulance Squad, Borough Hall, Public Works Garage
- 3) Sewer/Plumbing repairs: Borough Hall, Library
- 4) New security/fob system for Borough Hall
- 5) New Roof Borough Hall
- 6) Electrical upgrade Borough Hall
- 7) Fuel system install
- 8) Police Payroll
- 9) Borough and Police Computer/Technology Equipment upgrades
- 10) New Waste Containers on Bridge Street



MORE POLICE NEWS

Enhancing Public Safety and Police Efficiency

We are proud to share that Morrisville Borough has been approved to establish a **Central Booking Center (CBC) – a resource never granted to Boroughs**. This upgrade enables on-site fingerprinting and offender processing, dramatically streamlining procedures. It reduces officer downtime, improves workflow, and eliminates the need to rely on services from neighboring municipalities.

Costs to implement:

Cost to purchase: \$35,000

Annual Maintenance fee: \$6,500

Estimated yearly revenue: \$48,000

Additionally, to be a Central Book Center, the Borough will need a Sally Port – a secured, controlled entry area that ensures safe and secure transfers of detained individuals, protecting both officers and the public. The security enhancement supports modern policing protocols and reflects our commitment to professional, efficient, and safe law enforcement operation.

Welcome Co-Responder Taylor Szarko

Morrisville Borough joined the Bucks County Co-Responder Initiative.

The program pairs social workers with law enforcement, helping residents to connect with social service providers, while freeing up police officers' time.



Examples of co-responder calls include:

- Persons with known mental illness disconnected from services
- Questionable need for Adult or Child Protective Services
- Families and victims of traumatic events
- Geriatric issues with unknown needs for service

“Thanks to the proven and continued success of our administration’s partnership with local police departments, three more Bucks County communities will be served by a Human Services Co-Responder,” said Commissioner Chair Diane Ellis-Marseglia. “This program provides a valuable resource to police officers, allowing them to better focus their efforts on crime, and makes our neighborhoods safer while giving more vulnerable people in our communities the help they need.”

Protecting Morrisville: The Levee & Our Future Flood Defense

Residents love the scenic walking trail but the path serves a vital role in flood protection. Built in 1940, it is a 3,500-foot earthen berm, reinforced with a concrete flood wall and drainage structures designed to protect from rising waters of the Delaware.



Levee FEMA Accreditation ensures:

Stronger Flood Protection (meet modern standards)

Reduced Flood Insurance Costs (**lifting flood insurance mandate for many residents and allowing enhancements to the Park**).

Since 2017, Morrisville has secured **\$395,000 in grant funding** to complete the necessary engineering studies, structural evaluations, and FEMA reports. The final accreditation report will be resubmitted to FEMA in early 2025, with approval expected soon after. These investments are part of a broader **vision and commitment** to ensure the Levee continues to serve as a shield against flooding for generations to come.

Infrastructure Upgrades: to strengthen flood risks, two critical projects are in progress:

- ◆ Backflow Prevention System – prevent floodwaters from backing into Williamson Park during storms. **Grant Secured: \$27,563**
- ◆ Delaware Canal Wastegate Relocation – relocating to north of the Calhoun Street Bridge will prevent excess canal water from becoming trapped behind the Levee. **Grant Secured: \$212,625**

Rental Registration Program

The Borough started mandatory inspections of residential rental units to ensure the welfare of tenants and hold landlords accountable for their units. Our focus is to ensure tenants live in safe housing.

Message from Code Enforcement: When inspecting an occupied unit, we observe life safety aspects that we only see after the fire department, police or EMS have called us. Combustible storage around heaters, extension cords plugged into other extension cords powering space heaters, trash on stoves, insect infestations, smoke detectors issues, no fire extinguishers, blocked egress paths and exits. Hoarding situations where tenants can't get out and first responders can't enter. Within the last year Morrisville had 1 death and 3 fires in rental units. Landlords are focusing on what it's going to cost them. We focus on the value of a human life.

Patriots Park: Honoring History, Enriching Our Future

Patriots Park is adjacent to **Historic Summerseat**, former headquarters of George Washington during the Revolutionary War and deeply tied to our nation's history. The Borough acquired the property in 2016 through **\$252,900 in various grants**, demolishing the former school and clearing the way for transforming into a meaningful community space.

Since then, over **\$1.1 million** in funding and planning efforts have helped move this vision forward:

- ◆ 2018-2019: **\$555,000** from Bucks County CDBG for sidewalk replacements & ADA-compliant curb ramps
- ◆ 2020: **\$85,000** from the Greenways, Trails, and Recreation Program for a concept plan and **\$500,000** from the PA Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RCAP).



With available RACP funding, the Borough is now moving forward with, reconfiguring and upgrading parking area to serve both Patriots Park & Summerseat, installing new lighting for improved safety, and reconstructing damaged sidewalks & trails for better pedestrian access.

Future Vision - Actively seeking funding to complete the park's transformation. Once fully realized, Patriots Park will offer open lawn areas for community gatherings, festivals, and passive recreation with safe and accessible pathways. We are trying to complete many of these upgrades before the United States'

250th anniversary in 2026 to create a space that preserves and honors the legacy of Summerseat.

- Recyclables collected THURSDAY
- Call Republic for Bulk item pick-up
- Pickup days are delayed one day during any holiday week; Monday holiday has trash picked up on Tuesday/Friday; Thursday holiday has trash/recyclables picked up on Friday
- Six holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day
- Trash cannot be placed at the curb before 6:00 pm the day before collection

Borough Tree Policy

Maintenance and/or removal of trees are the responsibility of the property owner including the area between the sidewalk and curb ("verge strip" or "hell strip"). Permits may be needed to remove trees on homeowner property/hell strip. Permission is needed to plant on the hell strip.
